Price: \$344.00 Add to the cart Ask a question Ask all the items in the books by Magick View all the elements of Mark Alan Smith I recently purchased a copy of Mark Alan Smith's book The Queen of Hell from Ixaxaar and decided to review it (I was actually persuaded to buy it after reading Frey Aswynn's glowing review). The book itself serves as a dressing room for his Primordial Witchcraft Hekeit Current. I first became aware of Mr. Smith's work because he was one of the authors of Hekeit: Its Sacred Lights, by Sorita d'Este, with his entry entitled The Baptism of Fire. I found the record particularly interesting because it mentions that I have worked with Hekate along with The Horned God all my life, which is a combination that I myself work with. His narration then goes on to describe how Hekeit showed the true face of the Horned God as Lucifer and his very intense initiator experience with them (Note: Mr. Smith defines Lucifer as a pre-Christian being of light and gnosis, rather than a knee-jerk image of the Christian devil). off, let me say that the devotion that Mr. Smith feels to his goddess is obvious. He speaks of her with the loving zeal of someone who has dedicated his life to her, and it shows. His passion is contagious, and his writing can be hard to digest yet very powerful when you have a chance to think about it. It's not an easy read. This pour yourself a glass of whiskey and lock yourself in the study for the night kind of book. The book itself, if a work of art, is bound into shimmering green material with the gold-decorated Sigil Crown Hecate on the cover. Each book is individually consecrated with the authors of its own blood in a ritual that took apparently days. The book itself is intended to serve as a direct portal to hecate. It really feels alive and magical. You can tell that this is not just another book, but that you are in possession of something special. It's a real magic book. Only 999 copies have been made and there will be no reprints, so it is limited edition. It is written in true grimoir style. Although it contains many rituals, it is assumed that the reader has the necessary experience in witchcraft and magical resurrection. Many methods are mentioned in very general terms that leave the reader to fill in the gaps regarding specifics (which, in my opinion, is not such a bad thing). It's far from 101 texts! The contents of the book seem to be a cross between the works of Andrew Chumbley and Paul Hudson mastering witchcraft, and it is very much a combination of both folk and high magic. The first few chapters describe his Hecate current primary witchcraft, which he calls the system of traditional witchcraft under the auspices of Hecate the Witch. The first chapter details the working tools that are Vikki's classic tools and ceremonial magic, namely Athame, Bowl, Stick, and Pentacle, along with the obsidian sphere to serve as a gateway. The second chapter further describes the basic rite of the zone system, called the Hecate Cloak, which is basically a circle of casting in the name of Hecate with its symbolism superimposed on it. Poetry and appeals throughout the book are actually very nice and cause Hecate pretty well in my experience! In fact, the first time I performed them, I was brought into intense communication with Hecate, in which she detailed changes in its ritual format, what I must do in order to personally benefit from them. I guess this fine tuning is necessary for every person who works with it. Also included is the dedication of Rite Hecate along with a sigil to have potentially a tattoo on itself. The rite itself is beautiful, and although I have not yet fulfilled it, I look forward to it as part of my third required oath to seal our bond. I think the most controversial aspect of this book is the pantheon that Mr. Smith includes with Hecate. Make no mistake about it, this book is dark! It's not a mythological hecate the authors talk about, and her vision is more akin to her role in Chaldean oracles, fleshed out with the authors of her own personal gnosis, derived from many years of work and channeled experience. He describes Hekat as the Creator God and puts her at the top of his pantheon. He writes of her as the queen not only of the dark hell worlds, but also of the luminous empiric worlds (although the book focuses exclusively on her role as the queen of night paths). He pairs her in the pantheon with Lucifer as a sorcerer and Belial, a descendant and son of Lucifer. This I think is the biggest turn off for most people. He considers them three tridents of witch gods. I admit that this pairing gave me pause, and also it didn't seem quite right to me at first. This is the main criticism I've seen at other levels at work as well as on various message boards. However, amazingly, I realized how closely this system reflects the Robin Artisson Witch/Witch/Master paradigm. In fact he writes about how Lucifer and Belial share each other's nature and separate but fused faces, in much the same way as Artisson says of the Witch/Master. This should make me wonder if Mr. Smith is clicking on the same current that Artisson describes (purposefully or not), a current that I myself consider extremely accurate through my own experience, simply overlaying my own preferences for names on those who are ever elusive and changing individuals. The rest of the book only gets darker, giving sigils and methods of appeal to various demonic and qliphotic forces to help you in the work, including The Call of The Familiar, possessing a wolf spirit, a group of wolf-keepers, three Moir's, Dragon Of the Earth, vampires, and shadows of faces. Like I said, if you're not comfortable with a little darkness in your magic, you'll want to stay very, very far from this book. If you do, however, it could be your cup of tea. I must point out that there is a ritual given to balance your dark and light energies by referring both Lucifer and Archangel Michael to your body consistently. The remaining section of the book details the very intense rituals for the passage of the dark tree of life and the ascend to the throne of Hekat, thereby reaching the spiritual state of exaltation through Her initiations in conjunction with Lucifer. This is a very advanced work, and if you've read the authors joining Hekate: Its Sacred Lights it should give you a pause for its conduct if you're really really ready (note: I won't for years!). This process begins with a hecatean version of the rite of the toad bone! Although Mr. Smith makes it clear that the toad should be sacrificed without pain, rather than the legendary traditional method of skewering it with a few pins. In the Interviewed on Witchtalk Radio he mentions that he found his own toad of the recently dead car tire, which is a controversial yet common way to perform this rite these days (if I ever feel brave enough to perform a toad bone rite, I'll probably be on the lookout for the road to kill the toads myself). The rituals get more intense and esoteric from there, and I'll leave it to the reader to decide if they want to get the book to learn more because I won't comment on them. My own experience with this book: I have to admit to finding it a little darker than I'm used to. The system does cause Hecate very well, however in personal experience rather than hecate I'm used to dealing with! She is such a great all-encompassing deity that I have no doubt that she is one of her many faces, but this is one that is a little colder and darker, but paradoxically also more intimate than how I used to see her. Anyway, it gave me a deeper understanding of her nature, and in truth, I'm not all that sure I'm as gone from this new person as I originally was. Time will tell what I'm on the fence about how I feel about the Lucifer/Belial aspect. I have never worked with deities, although I do not deny that they may have aspects of the Witcher I know. Maybe they are darker more basic aspects? Taking Jason Miller's latest tips to give each magic system this involves without automatically sewing it according to the current level of comfort (and denying all growth opportunities), I plan to at least give them a try and see how I feel about them. Personally, I have no problem with Lucifer or working with dark deities, although I know for many it can be turned off. In short, it challenges me spiritually, and I personally for the challenge. If it doesn't feel good, then I won't continue. I have a policy of never basing my practice solely on one book or system, no matter how good the system is. I will most likely be incorporating aspects of this book into my own practice, but not all of them. I definitely feel it was worth the price to own it. I would suggest your advice that if you are thinking about buying, don't think about it too long. Long. queen of hell mark alan smith for sale
